Happy New Year!! I hope you all had a happy and healthy holiday season! The New Year is a time to reflect on the past and give the best of ourselves to the future. Thanks again for your ongoing support of your child and our school community! Please review this December/January Newsletter in its entirety and contact us if you have any questions or concerns.

The snow and cold temperatures are evidence that the winter season has arrived! December and January were shorter school months due to the winter break and then a few snow days at the start of January, but we still managed to accomplish many tasks as we educated our students. Thanks so much for joining us for our annual holiday program in December and we hope that the students enjoyed all their gifts from the generosity of our staff and donors. Both our students and staff displayed their talents in the program helping to jump start our winter holiday season!

We are entering the second semester of the school year 2024-2025. This month our students did some beautiful artwork during an art session with one of our consultants; and staff had a professional development session with a consultant providing them with additional strategies and suggestions for supporting and improving student performance. We also celebrated our December and January students and staff awardees, and our birthday honorees. And next on the horizon for the month of February we will celebrate Black History Month sharing information daily with students about prominent African American historical figures and their contributions to society and the world.

Below are some important reminders:

- ✓ Attendance Matters: (review parent/student handbook) Absences and tardiness add up and can negatively impact students' performance both academically and socially (see flyer). Students are expected to come to school on time daily (8:45 a.m. to 2:45 p.m.) If your child arrives after 8:45 they are late. Half days do count regarding attendance thus students are to attend school on half days. We understand OSSE continues to have some transportation challenges, but this is something that we can track/document and mark as excused. OSSE transportation hotline is 202-576-5000 you can call the hotline and report transportation issues. If your child is going to be absent you need to immediately provide an excuse note. Please do not send your child to school if they are ill, have fevers, constant cough, runny noses, pain, etc. And please note that we are required to follow the district's truancy policies. REMINDER: We follow DCPS for inclement weather closings
- Closely monitor and limit your child's use of computers, cell phones, social media, gaming, etc.
- Ensure that your child completes their homework and if you have questions about assignment(s) contact teacher(s)
- ✓ We are a uniform school (see flyer): All students are to wear the school uniform daily (except on Friday as this is a dress down day thus uniform is optional on Friday, but appropriate dress is still expected). Cold temperatures have arrived so please see attached uniform flyer and ensure your child has the appropriate uniform. If you need assistance with uniforms, please contact us.

Finally, as always thanks for partnering with us because Parents/Guardians + Educators working in partnership = Successful Students


